




Today's Scripture 4TH Sunday in **Ordinary Time**

ABOUT THE LITURGY: Sunday Mass

Please consider the teaching about Sunday Mass contained in one of the documents from the Second Vatican Council, The



"Christ indeed always associates the Church with Himself in the truly great work of giving perfect praise to God and making men holy. The Church is His dearly beloved Bride who calls to her Lord, and through Him offers worship to the Eternal Father. Rightly, then, the liturgy is considered as an exercise of the priestly office of Jesus Christ.

"By an apostolic tradition which took its origin from the very day of Christ's resurrection, the Church celebrates the paschal mystery every eighth day; with good reason this, then, bears the name of the Lord's day or the day of the Lord. For on this day Christ's faithful should come together into one place so that, by hearing the word of God and taking part in the Eucharist, they may call to mind the passion, the resurrection, and the glorification of the Lord Jesus, and may thank God who "has begotten us again, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, unto a living hope" (1 Pet. 1:3). Hence the Lord's day is the original feast day, and it should be proposed to the piety of the faithful and taught to them in such a way that it may become in fact a day of joy and of freedom from work. Other celebrations, unless they be truly of overriding importance, must not have precedence over this day, which is the foundation and nucleus of the whole liturgical year." (SC 8, 106)

It would be wonderful if you could manage to go every week during Lent!

Important dates during Lent: The last thing you need to know about Lent is to make note of essential dates like Ash Wednesday; Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday (The Easter Triduum).
