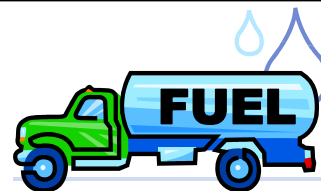

LIVING THE LITURGY:



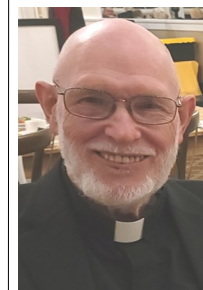
Wisdom

Wisdom is knowing how to live properly in this world created by God's love. This same love moves God to share his Word with us. This Word is indeed living and effective. We are encouraged to heed God's instruction, especially as it is laid out in the Ten Commandments, the Beatitudes, and the teachings in the Old and New Testaments. God also speaks to us in the richness and rhythms of creation. In today's Second Reading, we hear that the word of God is sharp, incisive, and makes everything clear. This is evident when we look at the state of the natural world that is suffering from the effects of climate change, human consumption, and pollution.

In contrast to these unhealthy ways of living, Jesus, in the Gospel Reading, invites us to let go of the habit of gathering and hoarding resources and wealth, as he invites the young man to let go and give. For that young man, and probably for many of us, that is a radical ask from Jesus, one that might seem to go too far. Still, we should remember God's promises. In the First Reading, we are told that by giving up the search for riches and focusing instead on the spirit of wisdom, "all good things together came." As we expand our concerns to include greater stewardship to the poor, may we realize even greater gifts than what we seem to have given up.

How can you make room in your life to care for those who are poor?

How can you grow in your awareness of your reliance on God?
