# **An Abundance** at Weddings

The Gospel Reading today presents us with a most memorable scene at a most

memorable event: a wedding. This event became even more memorable as it began to be clear that they did not have enough wine for the guests. Mary intervenes, though, and sets her Son to work. Even though his time had not yet come, Jesus acts with kindness and compassion, saving the couple from acute embarrassment and ensuring that the wedding celebration could continue with plenty of 'the best wine'.


In telling this story, John draws on Old Testament themes which picture God as the 'bridegroom' of Israel. The bond of love between God and Israel was meant to be deep and enduring - like that of a marriage. Such themes led to the expectation that the promised Messiah would restore this relationship. Traditionally, it was the bridegroom's responsibility to provide the wine for the wedding. In this passage, it is Jesus who ends up providing an abundance of the best wine, revealing Jesus as the divine bridegroom, come to take Israel back as bride.

Just as a wedding is only the beginning of a lifelong love affair, so the sign that Jesus performs at Cana is the beginning of his many sings that revealed his glory. It is also the beginning of the disciples' belief in him, the bridegroom acknowledged by John the Baptist (John

3:29). The gift of Jesus himself is one that far surpasses any other that we could have on our wish list.

Martin Luther King Jr. was a civil rights leader who fought for racial equality and voting rights through nonviolent protest. He led many marches, gave famous speeches, and helped pass landmark civil rights legislation.

#### **MARCHES**

- Montgomery Bus Boycott: Led the first nonviolent bus boycott in 1955
- March on Washington: Led the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom in 1963, where he delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech

Selma to Montgomery marches: Helped organize two of the three marches in 1965 during the Selma voting rights movement

#### **SPEECHES**

"I Have a Dream" speech: Delivered at the March on Washington in 1963, this speech is considered one of the most famous in history

#### **LEGISLATION**

• Civil Rights Act of 1964: Outlawed racial segregation and discrimination in the United States

Voting Rights Act of 1965: Helped African Americans access voting rights across the country

#### **OTHER ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

- Founded the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) in 1957
- Won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 King's nonviolent resistance efforts helped create a legacy of friendship and understanding.
