
LIVING THE LITURGY: Blessings

The scene described in Saint Luke's Gospel today, sometimes called the Sermon on the Plain, begins with Jesus offering a series of "Blessedness" similar to what we read in Saint Matthew's account of the Sermon on the Mount. Yet, there are startling differences. While Matthew lists 8 Blesseds, Luke lists only 4, along with 4 Woes. And while Matthew makes a distinction between being Poor and being Poor in Spirit, Luke does not. In fact, throughout Luke's Gospel there is a bias towards the poor, emphasizing how precious they are to God.

And so, Jesus proclaims, "Blessed are you who are poor, for the kingdom of God is yours." How should we understand this? Surely destitution and starvation are not blessed things! Yet, that is the poverty that many suffer so terribly. Still, Jesus invites his disciples to embrace a form of poverty that reaches out to help others. Throughout the Gospel according to Saint Luke there are many examples of how to live this out: fishermen and tax collectors leave everything to follow Jesus; Zacchaeus gave half his possessions to the poor, while some women put their resources at the service of the ministry. The only thing that is not an option is to hoard and keep your possessions for yourself alone. Poverty allows one to be detached from things, and be willing to share them, no matter how meager they may seem.

As the season of Lent is approaching, this could be a good time to renew our efforts at becoming agents of blessings through our prayer for those who are in need, fasting in solidarity with those who are hungry not by choice, and almsgiving to those who are destitute.
