LIVING THE LITURGY **A New** Commandment

John 14:15 Certainly, the disciples knew of the command to love one another, but Jesus expands on it by requiring his disciples to love as he loves. This love of the Lord Jesus for us is so great that it moves him to become one of us. The Lord is able to advocate for us because he understands our poverty and our pain. In becoming human, in his radical self-emptying, he experiences our humanity in his own flesh. Knowing precedes loving. One cannot love someone one does not know. Jesus goes to incredible length to know us, even to the point of becoming one of us.

For the disciples of Jesus, loving one another will now mean imitating the sacrifice of Christ in their daily lives and seeing in each other the face of God. It would mean defending and advocating for the poorest of the poor, perhaps even those whose interests may not be of interest to them. It will mean that the stranger becomes a friend, that service becomes accompaniment. It will mean knowing the poor and feeling their pain.

Living out this commandment requires solidarity with those we are called to love. When we share in the successes, hopes, and desires of the poor and feel their pain, we will find that we are drawn even more deeply into the mystery of Christ's love. Saint Teresa of Calcutta once said, "I have found the paradox that if you love until it hurts, there can be no more hurt, only more love."

Who do you struggle to love?

How might Jesus be inviting you to grow in compassion for them?

How can you respond in practical ways to this new commandment of love?
