The Sign of the Cross

So often we bless ourselves with the Sign of the Cross without pondering the deep meaning, the blessing, and the incredible grace that it bestows. The prayer invokes the Trinity God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We sign ourselves with the Cross of Christ, and by so doing, we demonstrate a desire to consecrate our lives and work to the Lord. This external sign tells the world that we belong to God and believe in the power of the Cross.

By marking our bodies with the Cross, we remember Jesus' passion and proclaim the power of his death and resurrection. It also recalls our baptism, when we were first signed with the cross and claimed for Christ. It was at our baptism, too, that we first received the Spirit of Adoption.

The use of this gesture is not limited to the beginning and ending of prayers. It is a blessing that ought to be used frequently as we ask for God's protection, wisdom, courage, insight, and peace. It is a concrete sign of God's love, and the ongoing action of the Trinity in our daily lives.

As the Trinity continues to will and do what is good for us and the world, so by the Sign of the Cross do we unite ourselves to that on-going work: the redemption and healing of everyone.

The love of the Trinity pours itself out as life-giving creativity.
